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Progress creates new constitution

A special meeting of the Guildford Progress Association was held on 22nd August to decide on the model rules pertaining to a new constitution.

The Model Rules adopted are:

- 1. To promote the township of Guildford within the best interests of the community.
- 2. Annual subscription fees are set out in the Association's guidelines and are due in advance on or before January 30th in each year.
- 3. Secretaries duties include to hold registers for Membership, Signatories to Bank Account, Register the common seal use, Key register and Investments.
- 4. The Treasurer to hold financial records for the current year then, once complete, hands them over to the secretary for filing.

The Association's Rules also include membership fees starting in 2012 as an entrance fee of \$10 with the annual subscription at \$5.

Meetings to be held every second month on the first Monday of that month.

Finally, an audit is not required as the books are to be checked yearly prior to the AGM, and presented at the AGM by a person outside of the executive committee.

Commented GPA Secretary Deb Dodson, "I believe the model rules now give good guidelines to the committee in regards to procedures and duties of committee members".



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Guildford Banners Revived

t was 23 years ago that a group of 12 Guild ford women came together and worked on the panels of what became known as the Guildford Banners. Six of those women are deceased and six of us remain.

After contacting each other and some of the relatives of those who are no longer with us we were able to meet at the Guildford Public Hall on the 6th August. Some of us had not seen the banners for years and we were surprised by their good condition. We all agreed that we would change as little as possible but as much as was needed. Josie Philipson kindly offered to replace the top sleeve on the banners that holds the support pole and also to provide a bag to keep them in.

Irene Fitness drew the designs from the ideas of the 12 people who made the panels.

"I seem to remember us all meeting at the Guildford Community Hall with a large roll of newsprint and people telling me galah, eagle, koala, magpie, etc.," said Irene, "Then they went away with the drawings and cut the patterns for the appliqued designs.

"The reason why I love community art is because it documents people's histories and in this case taking us back 23 years ago, as if it were today.

One of the women who worked on the banner was Gwen Fairweather who has since passed away. Gwen and her husband Len, who still lives in Guildford, used to run the General Store some years back.

Gwen's daughter, Jacqui Nolan offered a reflection on what the banner means to her.

"The purplish colour on my mum's part of the quilt in the gumnuts was originally used to make my recorder cover in Primary School. She has kept the scrap and used it on this, years later. The recorder cover is still in use and occasionally so is the recorder. Also the branch the cockatoo's are sitting on is a khaki colour and was originally used to make a jumpsuit for me in the mideighties. I have lots of photos of me with the boyfriend at the time (who for those who remember wrapped the big tree in fabric that he had friends paint with "Happy Valentine's Day Jacqui Fairweather"). The jumpsuit has gone but the memories remain. Brought back by the quilt."

Says Irene, "Community art is really something when seen in this context; when you consider that only six of us remain of the twelve women who worked on the banner. In a funny way the women who are no longer here make you feel more comfortable about your own mortality."


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150 years still going strong

JP Reserve a designated "safer place"

John Powell Reserve, Guildford has been formally designated as a Neighbourhood Safer Place of Last Resort during a Bushfire and there's a smart new sign near the front



entrance in Fryers Street that goes into some detail, mainly hosing down expectations.


Neighbourhood Safer Places - Places of Last Resort may afford some protection from radiant heat, the biggest killer during bushfire. However, the degree of safety afforded by the location will depend on a

number of factors, including the intensity of the bushfire. Please be aware there are still a number of risks associated with the Neighbourhood Safer Place:

They are not an alternative to either leaving early or staying and actively defending your property. Nor are they inherently "safe" places during a bushfire. Travelling to a Neighbourhood Safer Place may be dangerous due to traffic congestion, fire activity, heavy smoke, accidents or fallen trees.

Neighbourhood Safer Places - Places of Last Resort are not designed to replace a personal bushfire survival plan. CFA advises that everyone should have a written Bushfire Survival Plan.



GUILDFORD BOOKLET REVISION

For a long time now the booklet Guildford has been out of print and unavailable in bookstores.

The small, black & white format booklet is largely a collection of local history articles contributed by citizens of the day, items from the Mount Alexander Mail newspaper or research arti-



cles and images gathered by the editors of the previous editions.

The Guildford booklet was first com-

piled in 1970 by Castlemaine historian Marjory Rilen and revised in 1988 by Ray Bradfield. A lot of Loddon water has since flowed under our bridge and further history and progress has accumulated along the way.

The Guildford Public Hall Committee of Management (GPH) has recently obtained the printing rights to the Guildford booklet and is now considering the feasibility of an update to the booklet.

Greetings folks! It's September already and the **Eighth Guildford Banjo Jamboree is** almost upon us! We are sure that this year's Jamboree will be as enjoyable as the last seven, with loads of talented artists in **concerts a**nd **workshops**, and with **jam session**s going night and day.

The Jamboree aims to be a **friendly, enjoyable and informative** gathering of **musicians and music lovers** and we trust that all readers who are attending will stand by that ethos and ensure that everyone has a wonderful weekend. I know it is the highlight of the year for many people!

Old favourites such as the **Saturdee Dance**, the **Gospel Singalong**, the Big Tree **Parade** and **Photo** and the **Instrument Makers** Display at London House and Glen's **Big Banjo** will still be featured. The Friday night program will be dedicated to the memory of **Ron de Graauw**, with the groups **S.E.G.U.E**. and **Mysterious Mose** featuring, followed by a **chalkboard** segment. Our Hawaiian-themed **LOGO** is also a tribute to Ron. Thanks heaps to **Jason Conn and Rob Massey** for the terrific drawing. (Please do not use or transmit this image without the permission of the committee. Thanks.)

The **Robbie Watts Pick-Off** during the Saturday afternoon concert will again see some fierce banjo pickin' competition. The Open category will be sponsored by InstrAmental Music in Castlemaine, and there will be a Youth Award to be sponsored by the Ron de Graauw memorial fund.

The **Saturday afternoon concert** in the Public Hall will feature: Pennyweight, Faux Grass, High and Lonesome, Luke R Davies and Chris Mangan, Lonesome Still, and Archer and the Long Gone Daddies. The **Sunday afternoon** in the hotel beer garden will feature: Ricketty Bridge, Sean Kenan and Friends, Appalachian Heaven, Hard Drive Bluegrass Band, The Taylor Project, Chilly Strings, and Fat Chance. There will be four "**chalkboard**" **concerts** – Friday night, Saturday afternoon, Saturday night and Sunday afternoon. Register at reception at the Public Hall if you wish to perform.

Of course the Jamboree could not possibly happen in our little village without the generosity of the performers, MCs, dance musos and callers, sound crew, local businesses and organisations, committee of volunteers, and **YOU**, the **VOLUNTEERS** who come to the party and offer some time to sit on doors or sell tickets or merchandise, or help with the 101 other tasks necessary for the Jamboree to function. Please peruse the **Volunteer Commitment Form** in this newsletter to see whether you could give three hours of time for a weekend pass, or just donate an hour or two through the weekend. Forms can be returned in a number of ways – refer to the top of the form. You can also go to the Volunteers page on the **website** and fill in and submit the form directly.

If you have the **website** in your **Favourites** folder, please make sure you click on **Refresh** each time you go into it (and even on each page you open) to make sure you are viewing the latest information. Thanks to Chris Allan for maintaining the website at reasonable cost.

We will be repeating our experiment of installing a **session marquee** on the oval. This year it will be sited near the Cricket Pavilion, so be aware when choosing a camp site that music will be happening there well

into the night. If you are a sessioner you are asked to maintain quiet outside the marquee and generally be respectful of campers' need to have some sleep. There will also be a smaller tent available to sit and chat – we're labelling it "The Philosopher's Zone"!

Jamboree merchandise (T-Shirts, mugs, stickers and stubby holders) will be on sale at various times in the Public Hall or the CFA shed. Some merchandise from past Jambos will also be on sale at reduced prices. Castlemaine's **InstrAmental** Music Store and Gerry Hale's Melbourne store the **Guitar Gallery** will both have stands at the CFA shed on the Saturday morning.

Ticket prices have risen slightly again this year, but we are still able to keep our prices to a minimum as all artists play for the love of the music. **The full weekend ticket is only \$30.** Other ticket prices are on our website. Monies received go towards the running costs of the Jamboree, and towards donations to various local groups who give time, facilities, energy and skills to help the weekend to succeed.

The weather seems to be telling us that the **John Powell Reserve** will be back to normal this year, with camping and vehicles permitted. The shower block will be operational and there will be extra portaloos as well both on the oval and at the River Reserve.

FOOD PROVISION: We welcome Trevor and Hilary to the General Store. It's their first Jambo as food providers, so treat them gently! They will have lots of yummy things available. The Guildford Hotel, the CFA and the Primary School will also again be catering for our culinary needs in fine style! The Castlemaine Lions Club were not able to bring their food van this year, but we hope to have an alternative in place.

The issue of **FIRES** on the oval during the Jambo is always a difficult one. Absolutely **no uncontained** fires are to be lit on the oval at any time. Campers bringing **fire drums/burners** must agree to them being inspected by CFA volunteers. Drums are only to be used if they are on **stands** which are not going to be harmful to the grass. Patrons who bring drums are advised to bring their **own supplies of firewood/fuel**. It is illegal to gather wood from the River Reserve and the cost and logistics of the Jamboree supplying and distributing firewood make it impracticable to do so.

The Jamboree has become well known for its beautiful flower arrangements – even in the loos! However many of our normal supplies have flowered early this year and may be past it by the Jamboree. If you are able to supply flowers, blossom and/or wattle boughs, and/or green boughs suitable for everything from large arrangements to small vases, please let us know. You can bring them into the Music Hall on **Wednesday** 14th between 7pm and 8pm, or to the Public Hall between 10am and 11am on **Thursday** 15th. (Please bring them in a named bucket or other receptacle.)

For sound baffling and for ground cover in our marquees.

3. JAMBOREE STORAGE SPACE

Many thanks to Peter White for providing storage this year for all our precious Jamboree decorations and equipment. However we need to move, and we are needing a waterproof and hopefully mouseproof space – either a spare room or shed – for storage following this year's Jamboree.
