

Yes, your guess is as good


But the kids know what it is and as such it will be a part of the new amusement park thanks to the Guildford Progress Association.

For the past four years Councillor Redden has been representing the peo-



ple of Loddon Ward which includes Guildford and Newstead.

The former mayor Janet Cropley was not elected to Council.

In his new position Mayor Red-

den intends to become more inclusive.

"It's my responsibility to bring the people together," he explained, "by allowing them to express their views.

"As a council we have to be open to ideas from all sectors of the community and to achieve balance where possible".

This, of course is not an easy thing to do as Castlemaine is a hotbed of civil disobedience when it comes to issues.

CFA celebrates 70th Birthday with a bit of history

Brigade members and their families celebrated the 70th Anniversary of our Brigade's formation with a BBQ at Big Tree Park on Saturday 20th October.

Guest of Honor for the occasion was former Guildford citizen Bill Mein, who first became our Brigade Captain in 1974 and continued on in that role for many years.

The Brigade is fortunate in that an-

other former Captain Frank Passalaqua, had the foresight to record the Brigade's history and a reading of highlights was presented to reflect upon some of our history. Whilst Frank had recorded at least one highlight from every year, not all were read out at the BBQ, just as the following represent but a few of the more interesting snippets:

18 May 1942 – First meeting to form a Bush Fire Brigade was held in Guildford School Building. Meeting chaired by Cr W.J. Mein – President of Newstead & Mt Alexander Shire (Uncle of our Guest of Honor – Bill Mein)

A Certificate of Registration was received dated **16 Oct. 1942** – our Birthday!

8 February 1943 - It was decided that the Fire Call was to be three long chimes on school bell and firemen were to assemble on General Store corner.

On January 14th 1944 - a large fire

at Yandoit & Franklinford burnt for 5 days.

1st February 1944 - Guildford received its first fire truck a Chevrolet with two Furphy Tanks from the Allied Works Council in Melbourne. The vehicle was housed at the Passalaqua house located at current day London House Gallery.

A 1947 report reveals that 27 fire-



fighters were on the truck within five minutes. (No! the Fire Station wasn't built and near Hotel at that stage!!)

1957 - Fire Station erected.

1962 - Guildford Brigade had 186 registered members.

1965 - Large fire at Glenluce.

1973 - Passing of Cr John Powell President of Guildford Brigade for 31 years.

Most importantly - July 1978 Siren to be tested each Sunday morning at 9.00am.

Having addressed the History of our Brigade it is opportune to update Guildford residents with current day information:

The 2012 Election of Office Bearers saw all former Office Bearers standing down to encourage other Guildford RFB members to step up to the roles. Most former Lieutenants have assumed positions with the 'umbrella' Newstead Group and their appointment can only strengthen the efficiency of the member Brigades. Many Guildford residents will know and appreciate the capabilities of these former Guildford Officers and appreciate the challenge ahead for those filling their boots!

Mah Jong comes to Guildford

If the term "pung" and "chow" mean anything, then this group is for you. Yes we are starting a Mah Jong group in Guildford. If you have always wanted to learn or can play Mah Jong, come and join us.

Mah Jong is an ancient Chinese game dating back to the Han Dynasty 202 BC. Essentially a gambling game. Mah Jong as we know it developed in the late eighteen hundreds, probably originating in the Ngingpo region.

It was further developed in various parts of China, each region forming its own rules with special hands. Sets of tiles were found in various parts of the world around the turn of the century. It was known that they were part of a game but the method of play was unknown.

Joseph P. Babcock who lived in Soochow (now Suzhou) and worked there as a representative of the Standard Oil Company, was the first to painstakingly collect and interpret the many conflicting variations throughout China. Arabic numbers engraved on the tiles were first introduced by Mr. Babcock in 1920, when he imported to the USA sets of tiles in sufficient quantity. He simplified the game and introduced a standard set of rules which could be easily understood, giv-

The market has not been travelling well of late with only four turning up for the last one.


"In order to survive we need people to step up," said market convener John Burford, "otherwise we will have to think very carefully about the market's future.

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MURDER IN NEWSTEAD

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And you thought it was a quiet little town. But in the 1850s it was anything but that.

There is nothing more that catches the attention of people than that of a murder, and especially one that is unsolved.

The Newstead District Murders 1857-1859, written by Adrian Haas examines four murders that took place in or near Newstead during the 1850s.

This book also provides an insight into the life and times of the transient population that was travelling from one gold rush to the next. The text has been thoroughly researched and includes notes and an Index.

Herewith the first chapter of the book.

Newstead 1859: 'a sort of border country or No Man's Land'

A distressed, blood soaked, and almost incoherent man, burst into the Newstead Hotel just after dusk on the evening of Wednesday 6th April 1859. The hotel patrons soon discovered that there had just been a brutal unprovoked attack across the nearby Loddon River. The victim was the wife of a Hungarian hawker. The hawker and his family had been traveling through the district, and had decided to stop overnight at

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Newstead. There was little warning that the attack was imminent. By the time help reached the insensible woman had bled to death.

This was the fourth murder in the Newstead district between 1857 and 1859 coming barely a year after the discovery of an unidentified body in a Mia Mia Creek waterhole, located on the edge of the Newstead township. Despite the best efforts of the Victoria Police. that crime remained unsolved, and would remain so for many years to come.

Preceding the Mia Mia body in the waterhole case had been two murders, which took place nearby in 1857. The first murder was the cold-blooded shooting of a hard working miner, by a local storekeeper, at Green Gully in January 1857.

The second murder was a knife attack on a butcher at the Mia Mia goldfield, by his wife in June 1857.

The April 1859 murder was the last straw for many citizens of Newstead, who felt that the district lacked effective policing. Consequently, on the evening of 12th April 1859, a group of leading members of the Newstead community gathered together for a meeting at the Newstead Hotel, to consider the recent spate of murders that had occurred in the district, and to call for the establishment of a permanent police presence at Newstead.

The Newstead Hotel meeting asserted that as things stood, the district was 'left entirely defenceless, to the tender mercies of ruffians and vagabonds who appear especially to affect this locality.' 'a sort of border country or No Man's Land. It was stated, and is well known that the neighbouring gullies were the favorite haunts of the chief horse and cattle stealers of the

Self Help & Other Works

Also from Newstead, but far from being murdered, is Neil Boyack. His debut poetry collection Self Help and Other Works is out and is available internationally through the digital world as an e-book.

Boyack has had numerous collections of stories published both through major publishers and through his own publishing arm, One Eyed Girl. Since the early nineties, where Boyack came

Province, and that this was entirely due to the known absence of any local protection.'

The meeting stridently demanded that the government take immediate action to provide police protection at Newstead, and this subsequently occurred.

to prominence through the Grunge movement, alongside Christos Tsiolkas, Edward Berridge, Justine Etler and Andrew McGahan, Boyack's work has been characterised by a short, sharp, realist style. Quoting from the book's press release: Boyack's poems have followed his stories; sharp, jagged, sweet jabs of writing tasting of rust yet respecting all. Whether it's kids in care, outback grief, the brutality of pecking

> orders, or a lost wedding ring, you'll find that sometimes you have to jump into black water to find life-giving light.

> This do-it-yourself e-book ethos is Boyack's heritage, as he started his writing career self-publishing with his short story collection, Black. He also

however possesses a history of being published by major publishers such as University of Queensland Press (See Through), and the Vulgar Press (Transactions). This gives him a balanced view on the pros and cons of self-publishing.

Many works in 'Self Help and Other Works' have been published in the USA and Australia including the locally famous Newstead poem "Others in the Town" which appeared in 'Best Australian Poems 2011'.

Neil is also the director of the Newstead Short Story Tattoo, and he will be reading and preforming regularly over coming months


