## Guildford tower manufctured in Saudi Arabia (and other stories)



The Guildford Fixed Wireless Broadband tower installation is well advanced. However it was a surprise to discover that the Guildford tower appears to have been manufactured in Saudi Arabia perhaps to reduce the need for more of those pesky 457 visas?

We are not passing judgement on the place of manufacture but one hardly considers Saudi Arabia as a hot bed of technology.

And here we were worried about

letting a Chinese telco participate in our broadband.

The tower won't be connected until the rest of the locality is installed, namely Elphinstone, Taradale and North Harcourt. The North Harcourt tower is the subject of a VCAT application. Something to do with the tower blocking a line of sight.

In Elphinstone there has been a hold up because a landowner was in the middle of three towers. The existing Telstra tower, a proposed Vodaphone structure and the NBN Tower. This appears close to some sort of resolution.

Parents who ripped their kids out of the Steiner School because a tower was erected in Muckleford adjacent to the school are now left wondering where they are going to place their children. A move to Taradale was on the cards until it was found that the

school there was in itself too close to an NBN tower. It appears there is very little choice left if you want your kids to go to an alternative school.

It seem like they are up against some kind of alternative plot.

The Faraday (Mount View Road) NBN Fixed Wireless Broadband tower was reportedly vandalized this month. It appears that parts of the antenna assemblies were removed. At the time the Fara-

day tower was being powered from a mobile generator. Work to connect the tower installation to permanent electricity supply does not appear to have commenced yet.

The NBN's web site indicates that NBN wireless broadband service is scheduled to be available in Guildford and Faraday in mid 2014.

## Guildford, Surrey, British Columbia

Not much of historic value can be gleaned about Guildford, in Surrey, British Columbia, Canada.

But we did feel the need to include it in our series on the different Guildfords around the world.

Guildford Town
Centre is a town centre

of Surrey and a neighbourhood of the larger city of Surrey.

In fact it was named after Guildford in Surrey, England. Surrey owes its name to English geography. New Westminster municipal clerk H.J. Brewer looked across the Fraser River in 1879 and saw a land that reminded him of his hometown in Surrey, England.

Since Surrey, England is located just across the River Thames from Westminster, England, H.J. Brewer decided that the city located opposite New Westminster, BC on the Fraser River would be called Surrey.

Guildford occupies the north-eastern corner of the city of Surrey with its



northern border the shores of the Fraser River. Its southern borders with the neighbourhood of Fleetwood and extends roughly to the suburb of Cloverdale. Although its land area is extensive, in local vernacular terms, the Guildford "area" centres roughly around the Guildford Town Centre Mall and its surrounding blocks. It is a shopping centre of some 200 shops making it one of the largest in Canada.

The population of Guildford is around 50,000.

A notable landmark in Guildford is the 86 metre (280 ft) tall flagpole, which was previously located at the Expo 86 fairgrounds, and was then the record holder for world's tallest flagpole. It is also home to the Guildford Recreation Centre which is owned and operated by the City of Surrey to serve the recreational needs of local residents.







## 8 The Guildford Globe November 2013 Will the real Earl of Guildford please stand up

Earl of Guilford is a title that has been created three times in British history.

The title was created for the first time in the Peerage of Eng-



land in 1660 (as Countess of Guilford) for Elizabeth Boyle. She was the daughter of William Feilding, 1st Earl of Denbigh, and the widow of Lewis Boyle, First Viscount Boyle of Kinalmeaky. The title was for life only and became extinct on her death in 1667.

The title was created for a second time in the Peerage of England in 1674 for John

Maitland, First Duke of Lauderdale.

Despite these earlier creations the title of Earl of Guilford is chiefly associated with one branch of the North family. This branch of the family descends from the prominent lawyer and politician the Hon. Sir Francis North, second son of Dudley North, Fourth Baron North. He was Chief Justice of the Common Pleas from 1675 to 1682 and Lord Keeper of the Great Seal from 1682 to 1685. In 1683 he was created Baron Guilford, of Guilford (now spelled Guildford) in the County of Surrey, in the Peerage of England. He died at an early age and was succeeded by his son, the second Baron. He served as President of the Board of Trade from 1713 to 1714 and was also Lord-Lieutenant of Essex.

The third Baron, his son, represented Banbury in the House of Commons. In 1734 he succeeded his cousin as seventh Baron North and in 1752 he was honoured when he was created Earl of Guilford in the Peerage of Great Britain. He was also succeeded by his son, the second Earl. Known mainly under his courtesy title of Lord North, which he used from 1752 to 1790 and was

one of the most influential statesman of the second half of the 18th century. As Prime Minister of Great Britain between 1770 and 1782, he was a major figure in the American Revolution.

North also held two of the other great offices of state, those of Chancellor of the Exchequer and Home Secretary. He was succeeded by his eldest son, the third Earl who represented several constituencies in the House of Commons. Lord Guilford had no sons and on his death and the barony of North fell into abeyance between his daughters.

The barony of Guilford and the earldom was succeeded by his younger brother, the fourth Earl. He died childless and his younger brother followed him to become the fifth Earl who was Member of Parliament for Banbury from 1792 to 1794 and also served as Governor of Ceylon from 1798 to 1805. He was also childless and on his death the titles passed to his cousin, the sixth Earl who was a clergyman. He was succeeded by his grandson, the seventh Earl. His son, the eighth Earl, was a Lieutenant-Colonel in the Royal East Kent Yeomanry. When he died the peerages were inherited by his grandson, the ninth Earl. As of today the titles are held by the latter's only son, the tenth Earl, who succeeded in 1999.

Three other members of the North family may also be mentioned. Frederic Dudley North (1866-1921), great-grandson of Reverend Charles Augustus North, younger brother of the sixth earl who was a prominent civil servant in Australia. His son Charles Frederic North (1887-1979) was Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Western Australia from 1947 to 1953. Jonathan North (b. 1931), son of the Hon. John Montagu William North, second son of the eighth Earl, succeeded his maternal grandfather as second Baronet, of Southwell, in 1947

Lacking a different secondary title, the heirs apparent to the earldom have continued to use, without any legal basis, Lord North as a courtesy title. An unqualified reference to Lord North almost always refers to Frederick North, as Lord North, later second Earl of Guilford.

The family seat is Waldershare House, near Dover, Kent. The town in Surrey from which both titles derive is now spelt Guildford.



# MARY O'NEALE 04/04/1922-19/10/2013

ARY'S LIFE began at Featherston, New Zealand. She was born on the 4th April 1922. As with all devoted Catholic families of this era, she was baptised in the local Parish Church on May 7th 1923. In October 1933 she was also confirmed and took the confirmation name Teresa.

Mary was a country girl and always maintained a love of the rural setting her entire life. He parents Earnest and Johana works the land and Mary delighted in helping her father with various farm chores. Apparently she was a wiz with the axe and quite the expert wood chopper. Wood at the time had to be chopped expertly in order to fuel the oven in the family kitchen. Her mother, Johana was a wonderful cook who passed her skills to Mary. She was a great cook in her turn.

No doubt, as a good Catholic family Mary and her parents attended Sunday Mass and we can be quite sure that the Rosary would have been prayed every night after the family dinner. It was this solid family upbringing that led Mary to the religious life.

Mary entered the Carmalite order at a very early age, somewhere in her 20's we can presume. The Carmalites are an enclosed Order and Mary's days in the convent would have been completely regulated with a balance of work and prayer according to the wishes of her superiors. In the convent she was considered a good all rounder and the members of the community were delighted whenever she was assigned to the kitchen

for meal preparation, Mary was a founding member of the community when the Carmalite Sisters opened a new convent in Christchurch.

In 1978, after nearly forty years, she left the convent. At the time such a move would have been and extremely serious decision. As she approached this departure, mart would have a spent a lengthy period of discernment and prayer. It would not have been a decision she would have taken lightly and would have involved reference to Rome as she had taken what is referred to as Final Vows and she needed to have been dispensed from these so she could leave with the full blessing of the Church. Leave she did. And in so doing she had the happy experience of walking along a beach in Brighton, New Zealand for the first time.

Soon after leaving the convent Mary came to Australia. However she continued her work in the Church and was first a parish pastoral worker in Eastwood in Sydney and then at Bentleigh in Melbourne. As a parish Pastoral worker she would be involved in various parish ministries such as preparing children for sacraments, helping the priest to organise the various liturgies as well as parish visitation works to families in need etc.

On her retirement Mary came to live in Guildford. This was a return to the country life wish she relished. She became and Australian Citizen in October 1983 and was most proud of this.

The Guildford Cricket Club would like to extend its sincere sympathy to Tom, Charlie, Ellen and family.


